Career Technical Education Council

The Career Technical Education Council met on Wednesday, Nov. 9 in San Diego. Carolyn Zachary the Career Technical Education (CTE) representative for the California Department of Education (CDE) presented a report. The CTE Council Purpose was revised to read as follows: "The purpose of ACSA Career Technical Education (CTE) Council is to support administration and insure relevant, high-quality CTE programs that prepare PreKadult students for successful transition to careers and postsecondary education through coreintegrated curriculum, legislative advocacy, professional development, communication, and collaboration." Martha Alvarez, ACSA Chair on Accountability, requested input on the SBE current recommendations on the College and Career indicators. There continues to be concerns that the indicators are focused too heavily on academics with no requirement to include career. Current state funding allocations and grants will expire by 2019 and are not expected to be renewed. It is the CDE's intention that LEAs will explicitly include CTE into the LCAP with no expectation for additional funding. The next meeting of the CTE Council will be

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in Sacramento at the Educating for Careers Conference in March.

The Adult Education Council met on Thursday, Jan. 12.

We had a California Department of Education (CDE) update from Chris Nelson. It is great to have the CDE administrator for adult education in attendance at every one of our ACSA Adult Education Council meetings. Chris is very committed. He pointed out adult education being specifically named this year in the governor's budget summary. As you read that summary, please notice the term ongoing as used to describe adult education funding. That is good news and strong affirmation on adult education's place in California's focus on workforce development planning. Adult education is relevant and is not going to disappear. When planning with district finance personnel, it is important to help them understand that AEBG is not a grant. It is ongoing funding. Chris reminds us that WIOA Title II applications are due Friday, Feb. 10.

Leg Action Days are coming up. Local leadership is always encouraged to meet locally with lawmakers to share your successes in adult education. When lawmakers meet with adult education students, they get a first hand narrative about the impact adult education has on their constituents' lives. The CCAE Central Section Executive Board is

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organizing a visit to the capitol on Tuesday, Apr. 4. Students and staff will be attending this great event to engage state lawmakers on issues important to adult education. Contact Lori McClintick, Visalia Adult School and CCAE Central Section Legislative Action Chair, at *Imclintick@vusd.org* for more information. Seats are limited and planning is happening now.

There have been long discussions about undocumented students, their families, and our role as educators. With compulsory education laws for students under the age of 18 (Educ. Code § 48200, Plyler v. Doe, 457 U.S. 202 (1982), Educ. Code §§ 220, 234 et seq.), we have a relatively clear plan of action in our K-12 schools. There are many concerns in adult schools as they serve students over the age of 18. Adult education will continue to serve undocumented students. So, what information is collected on adult education students? Here are the facts: In particular cases, school districts are required to obtain information on their adult education students. For example, in counties where U.S. District Courts are located, the city or county superintendent of schools is required on a monthly basis to obtain the names of persons who have filed their intention to become citizens of the U.S. or their petitions for naturalization. (Educ. Code section § 52550) The superintendent is then required to send notices to these individuals of the authorization the governing board has in providing classes in citizenship under particular circumstances. (Educ. Code § 52551 et seq.) For more information from ACSA, please go to https://

Google Docs Tip - Configure Your Text Styles



Rather than manually formatting every bit of text in your document, you should format your text using styles instead. This means that, rather than setting all your headlines to a certain font size and bold text, you can



just click the style box and set them to "Heading 1."

You can easily edit the font setting used for different styles. First, format some text to use the type of formatting you want to use for a style. Select that text, click the style box at the top of the screen, and click the arrow to the right of the style you want to modify. Click the "Update 'Style Name' to Match" option and that style will now use the type of formatting you selected.

To save these customized styles and use them in other documents, click the Options menu at the bottom of the list and select "Save as my default styles."

KCSOS partners with Harvard to offer Continuous Improvement Consortium pilot program for local educators

Teams of educators were pushed beyond their comfort zone and asked to take a good, hard look at the obstacles keeping their students from meeting success during a firstof-its-kind Continuous Improvement Consortium (CIC) in Kern County.

The pilot project is an adaptation of Harvard's Public Education Leadership Program (PELP), which incorporates a unique framework that helps school districts focus on a problem that is preventing improvement and innovation. The program teaches a systematic approach around system-level problem identification, analysis and building a strategy toward a solution.

KCSOS's Learning Network — the team that oversees professional development and collaborative learning around continuous improvement and district LCAPs is testing the concept to see if it makes sense for their future work.

The pilot cohort participated in the Strategic Problem-Solving Institute held at KCSOS's downtown headquarters in December. Teams of district stakeholders from Lost Hills, Maple and Pond came prepared with a specific challenge that they had pre identified.

Over three days, the teams were immersed in learning through collective workshops and then broke out into their teams to tackle the problem they were wrestling with.

Share out sessions were held several times so teams could report on progress and get feedback from their peers from the other districts.

Michael Figueroa, special assistant to the chief academic officer at KCSOS, and organizer of the pilot, said the CIC was designed to build a robust, cross-district learning network and that receiving perspective from colleagues from other districts is a valuable part of the learning process.

"Defining a problem is the most important, and often the most challenging, part of the problem solving," said Kathryn Short, one of the Harvard doctoral students who facilitated the workshop.

This notion proved true as district teams grappled with adequately articulating what their problem was during the workshop's first day. The team from Maple originally identified its problem as a lack of data to track student achievement.

"Data is a means, not a problem," Short challenged. "So, what is the true problem?"

That type of pushback was part of the framework and meant to provoke a productive struggle to engage participants in deeper thinking, facilitators said. "A problem is good when it makes you feel uncomfortable," Short added.

Maple School District Superintendent Julie Boesch said her team's initial problem was actually identified as their solution over the course of the process. Rather than a lack of good data, the underlying problem, they found, was the district did not consistently use differentiated instruction to meet the needs of students based on an identification of their unique needs.

Customizing instruction can be achieved by gathering and analyzing data and creating rubrics to improve current practices, the team from Maple learned.

Once the problem had been refined, facilitators helped teams analyze their problems so that the root causes were clear. Teams then developed a theory of action — or a plan mission statement — and identified strategies that they would implement to solve the problem.

"As we moved through the process the team was able to quickly identify resources and potential areas of growth to move forward in our

district," Boesch said. "It was also a great time to begin to develop a plan for a strategically created system of improvement."

Participants returned to their schools with the knowledge, tools and confidence to begin operationalizing what they learned. Follow-up site visits, observations and additional feedback by the other teams and technical support from KCSOS will round out the pilot program.

In post Institute surveys, participants praised the program as being very beneficial, noting that "it's mind changing" and "the program is rigorous and so very much worth it."

In fact, 95 percent of participants said they would recommend the program to other districts.

"Based on our learning, we hope to make adjustments to the program, so the CIC can eventually become a hallmark of the Learning Network," Figueroa said.

Industry partnership enhances student experience at the North Kern Vocational Training Center

The North Kern Vocational Training Center (NKVTC) has a great industry partner relationship with The Wonderful Company, formerly known as Paramount. The construction class at the North Kern Wasco site is



taught by industry professional John Steward, who has been partnered with The Wonderful Company for the past several years. One of the hallmarks of a quality Career Technical program is on-the-job training. Another is strong and effective industry partnerships. With a class like construction, on-the-job training can be a challenge. Under the guidance of blueprints provided by The Wonderful Company architects, students build a complete house on campus. Throughout the process, they are guided by a variety of industry professionals, such as electricians and plumbers. Once the house is completed, it is deconstructed and moved to Lost Hills by The Wonderful Company, where it is donated to a family.

SIG funds will transform Charles H. Castle Elementary School into a STEAM academy

The Panama-Buena Vista Union School District was awarded a five-year, \$7 million School Improvement Grant (SIG) from the Califor-

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nia Department of Education (CDE). The grant, written with support from the Kern County Superintendent of Schools, will be used to transition Charles H. Castle Elementary School, a socioeconomically disadvantaged low-performing school, into a STEAM academy.

Work on the transformation began when the grant was awarded on Nov. 3, 2016, with implementation starting Aug. 2, 2017. The transformation plan for the STEAM Academy focuses on five key elements: Leadership Reform, Teaching and Learning, Student Non-Academic Support, Family and Community Engagement, and Support and Oversight.

The overarching goal of the STEAM Academy is to improve student achievement by providing innovative learning experiences for students with an emphasis on science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics delivered through an integrated problem based learning (PBL) approach. This model will allow for students to engage in authentic learning experiences, guided by STEAM specialists, while teachers use extended collaboration time to review assessments, analyze student work, and plan. Additionally, students will have the opportunity to participate in extended day electives and a summer school program with exciting field trips.
