
Region XI members were among the more than two dozen ACSA members who led a contingent of nationwide educators to Washington, D.C. in September for the third annual ACSA-National Association of School Superintendent's Federal Advocacy Day. Representing Region XI were Jose Morales, Director of Migrant Education with the Kern County Superintendent of Schools Office, and Terri Rufert, Superintendent of Sundale Union Elementary School in Tulare and State ACSA Vice President for Legislative Action.

"It is always amazing to me that no matter which state administrators come from, we all have the same issues and desires for our students," said Rufert. "That makes advocating for them in Washington, D.C. so much more powerful; we truly have one voice for our nation's students."

"The face of public education in the United States is changing every day and California is always the leader in student advocacy and forward-thinking practices," said John Roach, NASS executive director. "This year we opened the conference up to educators at all levels so we could take the real world classroom experience to Capitol Hill."

The two-day event kicked off with a presentation from former West Virginia Gov. Bob Wise, who now represents the Alliance for Excellent Education. Conference participants also were briefed on the federal Every Student Succeeds Act




Every Student Succeeding

was great momentum and we are looking for next region and committee/council touch-points. Staff will consider multiple communications and marketing tools that can be used to provide an overview and consistent messaging about the strategic plan.

Next steps:

- Identify and allocate resources.
- Begin working on action steps.
- Continue to build and roll out the communication strategy.
- Find tune planning systems and calendars.
- Identify performance measures.

Annual Audit

Our ACSA staff did an outstanding job, while short-staffed, to prepare

for the annual audit with our auditor, Dave Ljung, a partner with Gilbert & Associates. There were no major findings and all past recommendations were implemented. It is still a goal of ACSA to build its reserves from the current two months of cash-on-hand (reserves available to pay bills) to three to six months, which is a reasonable non-profit best practice.

Leadership Summit

We'll be in San Diego November 7 through 10 for the Leadership Summit. We encourage all members to attend and represent Region XI.

Retirement Committee: Activity Design

The Retirement Committee will be working at the national level on advocacy efforts. They will head to Washington, DC to cover topics that are pertinent to all ACSA members,

including supplemental benefit maintenance, death benefits, government pension off-sets, and windfall elimination provisions. The Board will make a fiscal commitment of \$10,000 to the committee for their design activity.

Fatal School Violence Task Force

The Fatal School Violence Task
Force has been meeting since June
to discuss the current level of violence at schools. The task force assembled a tool kit for schools and
districts which is now on the ACSA
website and the ACSA app. A discussion took place about policy implications, specifically around mental health, school climate and gun
safety. The board feels consideration
about policy rests with the Legislative Policy Committee (LPC) and
their recommendations with regard
to impact for students. They sug-

gested a member of the committee present the work of the task force to the LPC to inform their work.

Accountability Task Force

The group has been meeting for two years and has provided extensive input into the design of the dashboard. Now that the dashboard is continuing to be tweaked, the task force still has a purpose and will stay in existence. The group will be reconstituted and new members will be added.

President Holly Edds is considering a task force on mental health and school climate issues.

Educational Options Committee

The Educational Options Committee met on Friday, Sept. 14 in Sacramento to discuss important topics as they relate to Educational Options programs.

Together, the group collaborated and provided feedback to support The Alterative Task Force as they make decisions for Educational Options schools and legislative issues in California. In addition, the group is in collaboration with ACSA Leadership Academies to help infuse alternative education.

The mission of ACSA Educational Options is to be the leader at the state level in promoting best practices in teaching and learning while promoting, supporting and influencing accountability, programming, and credentialing, in addition to financial and legislative issues facing the educational options program in the state **Educational Options Programs** which serve approximately 1.1 million students in California. There is a sense of urgency to serve the most vulnerable and invisible diverse students with the highest rate of poverty, the highest number of students of color, the highest rate of ELL students. There exists a moral imperative to provide equitable access for those students who have been cast aside. They must re-engage in a safe place where hope can be instilled to aspire to lifelong goals through high expectations and opportunities for career and college opportunities. It costs \$60K per year to incarcerate one person. Job training in prison or personalized life skills/job training/education in schools? We make a difference everyday helping to build resilient, compassionate and competent students even when they have the odds stacked against them. We believe there is a place for everyone at the table and we want you to know how honored we are to serve our students, our schools, and our communities.

Region XI has recently launched its first Educational Options Breaking Barriers Network (ACSA BBN). The mission of ACSA BBN is to develop a strong advocacy for Educational Options students in the region, build and maintain networking opportunities for educators, share and explore model practices in teaching and learning, and influence accountability and legislative issues. The network held a No-Host Mixer on Friday, Oct. 19 at The Planing Mill in Visalia. The group is also offering networking meetings on Tuesday, Dec. 11, Wednesday, March 20, and Wednesday, May 15 at the Visalia Doe Complex at 1 p.m.



- Be well informed. Do your research before you meet with your legislator this will will help you identify with them and communicate clearly.
- **Understand other perspectives.** Anticipate being presented with an opposing view and don't be afraid to have an in-depth discussion.
- Be clear on your desired outcome. Educate, then advocate.
- Make it personal. Meet face to face whenever possible.
- **Know your audience.** Understand who the individual legislators are and how much influence they have in the field of education.
- **Bring positivity to the table.** Focus on presenting solutions and options to resolve the problem instead of focusing on the problem itself.
