Name: Gudiel Crosthwaite, Ph.D. Title: Superintendent

What inspired you to become an administrator? "Ultimately, I was inspired by the injustices in society and the opportunity to help collectively create a more just world. As someone who came from limited resources; the first in my family to earn a high school diploma and a first generation college student, I wanted to ensure opportunities for more people like me.

I mean people have died, so that I could have an education! Serving as an Educational Leader is an opportunity to transform societies, one person at a time. It is my contribution to creating a just and right society."

What do you enjoy the most about working in LUSD?

"Working in collaboration with the community; which includes our staff, parents, and most importantly students. The work we do and the challenges we face in this community are due to generations of lack of investment and limited resources. Our stakeholders understand this. Their voices are pertinent to the conversation and planning. Anything we can accomplish is truly the result of a partnership that emphasizes and places students first."

What are some characteristics that you believe all administrators should have?

"Listening and empathy are the common responses to this type of question, but I believe love for the community and courage to advocate are even more valuable. Love has to be the primary driver for building, and the courage to advocate for resources that will raise the profile of communities like Lynwood is essential. As educators we learn a lot from our stakeholders, they truly give us a sense of purpose and accomplishment. The system does not work without them. When the relationship between educators and the community is collaborative it yields humbling and reciprocated Love!"

What has been your most rewarding experience as an administrator?

"Knowing we are helping kids graduate. Inspiring and giving our youth hope because often, they begin giving up on themselves. Our students are the hope and inspiration for others: parents, friends, siblings. Each year during the graduations, I get emotional. They are a constant reminder that WE are Changing Lives; creating direct, multigenerational impact."

What advice would you give to a new district or site administrator?

"I would tell them it is important to come with an open mind. We have our own formal and informal opinion. The people in the community have a capital. It may not be a degree. We can not come in with ideas without listening to those who are there. The collective effort is far greater. Be aware and learn to work with different people, listen to different perspectives. Have discussions grounded in what is best for kids. Listen to the marginalized voices that are not at the table. Remember the old adage, "If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together."




Name: Brian Lucas, Ed.D Title: Assistant Superintendent, Human Resources

What inspired you to become an administrator? "I love (and still do) the larger impact administrators can have on entire school and/or District populations and while sometimes it's admittedly

hugely frustrating, I love the fact that as administrators we never really know what's coming next. I have never been bored a single day in administration and I am intrigued by the fact that as administrators, we have opportunities to learn about all functions of schooling: curriculum, politics, pedagogy, staff relations, finance, operations, facilities, HR, safety, psychology, nutrition, mental health ... and the list goes on!

What do you enjoy the most about working in LUSD? "Easy question: the sense of family. Lynwood is a close-knit community, with many residents as employees and many alumni in our workforce. This can often lead to an insular / "clique-ish" atmosphere, but I have felt the complete opposite from Day 1 of working here and have felt welcomed and appreciated. I also think this community feel manifests itself in what we all do for students: really wanting the best for Lynwood's children. And THAT feeds my soul."

LASA SPOTLIGHT Dr. Brian Lucas

What do you believe to be some characteristics/qualities of a good administrator?

"In no particular order: sense of humor, flexibility, creativity, compassion, patience, a presence, organization, calm-in-the-storm, love of kids, and an appreciation for all school staff. (Actually, I rank "love of kids" and "sense of humor" at the top!)"

What advice would you give to someone who is thinking about becoming an administrator?

"Prepare yourself for the hardest - but the most rewarding job - in education today. Find a mentor, offer your help to admin., shadow administrators, debrief with them (e.g., "so walk me through how you handled x" or "what thoughts or planning did you have as you entered into this situation?"). Assess your communication and motivation skills: in my opinion, 95% of the work of successful principals is in communicating (goals, challenges, bad news, policy, good news, expectations) and motivating staff and students towards great things."

With the changes in K12 as a result of the pandemic and declining enrollment, how does the role of Human

Resources ensure that districts continue to thrive? *"For the short-term, I feel it's about doing everything we can to keep folks in place as we transition between these learning environments. I do think our recruitment and hiring teams have done a yeoman's job in getting people during a nationwide labor shortage. For the long-term, I think there are exciting opportunities we learned from the pandemic that should be incorporated into our work lives and the way we view school and the structure of school."*

What things do you do to decompress after a long and difficult day in the office?

"As a human resources professional, I wish I could say I take a good walk or whip up a healthy smoothie! But reality is, I often get some of my favorite Chinese (Yang Chow!) food, a good, cold beer, and watch 90 Day Fiance, some detective show, or way too much TikTok. Moral of the story here: Do as I say, not as I do."

What inspired you to become a Principal?

It is definitely a blessing to have this opportunity."

What do you enjoy the most about working at Washington Elementary and what do you want your school to accomplish this school year? "What do I not love about working at Washington? What has been your most rewarding experience as a site administrator?

"It has been rewarding to see our students grow. Not only that, but building the PBIS program at our schools has also been inspiring, and I am very proud of our teams working diligently to support our students."

What advice would you give to a new site administrator?

"My advice to new administrators is to reach out to others for support as needed. It's always ok to ask questions and connect with other site administrators to share ideas and offer each other support. In addition, talk with your staff and students, be interested in learning about them and make a connection. Finally, follow up with staff and families after listening to their needs."
